TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACT RELATING TO THE LAW AND ORDER COMMITTEE, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE, AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING TITLE 2 OF THE NAVAJO NATION CODE TO CODIFY VIRTUAL ATTENDANCE BY COUNCIL DELEGATES AT STANDING COMMITTEE MEETINGS AND NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL SESSIONS

**PURPOSE**: The purpose of this legislation is authorize Council Delegates to attend Council Sessions and Committee Meetings through virtual methods, i.e., audio or video teleconferencing platforms.

This written summary does not address recommended amendments as may be provided by the standing committees. The Office of Legislative Counsel requests each Council Delegate to review each proposed resolution in detail.

20	A. The Law and Order Committee is a Standing Committee of the Navajo Nation Council	
21	with the responsibility to with the responsibility to review and make recommendations

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## SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. In the 2020, the Navajo Nation was forced to quickly enact emergency measures to mitigate the deadly spread of the Coronavirus pandemic which has caused 84,206 positive COVID-19 cases and 2,162 COVID-19 related deaths, to date, on the Navajo Nation. These emergency measures included the enactment of the March 11, 2020 Public Health State of Emergency for the Navajo Nation and underlying Public Health Orders including, but not limited to, employees working from home, the shutting down of government offices and non-essential business, public gathering limits, mask mandates, closing boarders to visitors and enacting curfews.
- B. To ensure that the Navajo Nation's governing body could continue to operate and respond to the Coronavirus pandemic without violating Public Health Orders, including stay-at-home orders and public gathering limits, the Navajo Nation Council enacted CMA-04-20, attached as **Exhibit A**, which temporarily allowed Council Delegates to conduct and attend Council sessions, standing committee meetings, and subcommittee meetings using telecommunication methods, such as teleconference calls and video conferencing.
- C. In 2021 and 2022, the Navajo Nation slowly began to open up government offices. Meeting and conducting the business of the Nation was done in person with certain limitations and safeguards in place, especially after the COVID-19 vaccine became available. The Council, standing committees, and subcommittees moved to hybrid-style meetings, allowing virtual attendance by delegates, presenters, government officials and the public.
- D. Council Delegates were provided a unique opportunity to use virtual meetings, which moved to hybrid in-person and virtual meetings, to continue the necessary and important work of the Nation. The use of virtual meetings was not only effective, but provided more opportunities for Delegates to advocate for their communities at Council and Standing Committees, as well as to provide enhanced transparency to the public.
- E. On June 15, 2023, Dr. Buu Nygren, President of the Navajo Nation and the Commission on Emergency Management issued CEM-23-06-15, attached as Exhibit

- **B**, deactivating the March 11, 2020 Public Health State of Emergency for the Navajo Nation and returning government operations to pre-COVID-19 status.
- F. The Navajo Nation finds it in the best interest of the Navajo Nation and the Diné People to amend Title 2 of the Navajo Nation Code to allow Council Delegates to continue virtual attendance at Council sessions, standing committee meetings, and subcommittee meetings.

#### SECTION THREE. AMENDING TITLE 2 OF THE NAVAJO NATION CODE

The Navajo Nation hereby amends Title 2 of the Navajo Nation Code, as follows:

# TITLE 2. NAVAJO NATION GOVERNMENT CHAPTER 3. LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

## SUBCHAPTER 2. NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL MEETINGS

§ 106. Compensation of Council Delegates

- A. Delegates shall be compensated by an annual salary of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per year. All Council Delegates shall be paid bi-weekly. A salary increase may be approved by the Navajo Nation Council but shall not become effective unless ratified by two-thirds (2/3) of all Navajo Nation Chapters within one hundred twenty (120) days of approval by the Navajo Nation Council. The provisions of this Section shall not apply to mileage payments, per diem payments, deferred compensation benefits, or any other payments or benefits which are separate from the bi-weekly base salary established in this Section.
- B. Delegates attending a Navajo Nation Council meeting or their respective committee meetings, either in person or virtually, may receive sixty dollars (\$60.00) per diem for each day official business is conducted, and mileage reimbursement for use of a private vehicle at the rate established in the Navajo Nation Travel Policy and Procedures Handbook, and amendments thereto.

- <u>C.</u> Chairpersons of <u>standing</u> <u>Ccommittees may receive as compensation, for extra time spent by the Chairperson beyond meetings to execute committee business, <u>a payment</u> <u>of</u> eighty dollars (\$80.00) per diem for each committee meeting day.</u>
- <u>D.C.</u> For every week of a <u>Regular sSession</u> of the Navajo Nation Council <u>and per day for any Special Session</u>, delegates <u>attending in person shall</u> be paid mileage equal to one round trip to Window Rock from their residence <u>and return</u>, according to the official <u>mileage chart of the Controller at the rate established in the Navajo Nation Travel Policy and Procedures Handbook</u>, as amended. <u>Mileage shall not be paid for virtual attendance</u>.
- <u>D</u>. For each complete committee meeting, delegates of <u>to</u> the Navajo Nation Council, <u>who attend the meeting in person</u>, shall be paid mileage equal to one round trip to Window Rock, from their residence and return, according to the official mileage chart of the Controller at the rate established in the Navajo Nation Travel Policy and Procedures Handbook, as amended. Mileage shall not be paid for virtual attendance..
- EF. Full pPer diem shall be paid only for in person or virtual attendance of at least three hours of meeting or until all agenda items are concluded. Mileage shall be paid only for in-person attendance of at least three hours of meeting or until all agenda items are concluded.
- <u>FG.</u> Delegates, or their beneficiary in the event of death, are paid a deferred compensation benefit when they leave office.

§ 110. Definitions

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- Y. Virtual Attendance means that a person is not physically present at a meeting, but is still able to participate in the meeting, in a manner similar to those physically present, by means of an audio and/or video conferencing platform.
- Z. Virtual means remote access through an audio or video conferencing platform.

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§ 161. Place

- A. All regularly scheduled or Regular and sSpecial sSessions of the Navajo Nation

  Council shall be held at the Navajo Nation Council Chamber located at Window Rock,

  Navajo Nation (Arizona) with the following exceptions:
  - 1. If the Chambers in Window Rock are unsuitable for meeting, because of fire, physical damage, remodeling or other cause, the Speaker may designate an alternate meeting place in Window Rock, and if an alternate site is selected, the Speaker shall give reasonable prior notice to all Council Delegates.
  - 2. Notwithstanding any alternate site selection by the Speaker, Aa simple majority of all Council Delegates may agree to hold a Council meeting in some at a location in Window Rock other than the Council Chambers. Such agreement may be by written petition or by motion at any regular or special session of the Navajo Nation Council.

# §167. Failure to attend

All Each sitting delegates to of the Navajo Nation Council shall attend, either in person or virtually, all regular and special meetings of the Navajo Nation Council or Committees, unless the delegate's participation is excused by the Speaker or Committee Chairperson, respectively. If any delegate is absent from sixty percent (60%) or more of the meeting days Council Sessions and/or standing committee meetings within a one-year period, the Navajo Nation Council may consider a motion to censure said delegate. If his/her absence continues after such censure, the Navajo Nation Council shall have the authority to declare the delegate's seat forfeited and vacant.

# § 183. Meetings; quorum

A. All Regular and Special meetings of the Navajo Nation Council standing committees, subcommittees, and or commissions shall be held in Window Rock, Navajo Nation, (Arizona). Such meetings may be held elsewhere within the Navajo Nation if sufficient funds are available, and the meeting is approved, in writing, by the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council.

- C. For a meeting to be deemed to have been held, each of the following acts shall occur: (1) a quorum is present; (2) an agenda is adopted; (3) substantive actions (approval, disapproval-or-table (voting or tabling) are taken; and (4) per diem and roundtrip mileage, as applicable, are paid to committee members or commissioners.
- D. Meetings shall not mean work sessions, workshops, orientations, trainings, and business meetings with Navajo or non-Navajo entities, therefore, and no meeting per diem payment, as set forth in 2 N.N.C. § 106, for work sessions, workshops, etc. shall be paid for participation in such gatherings. See 2 N.N.C. § 106. Meetings held elsewhere within the Navajo Nation shall be written permission of the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, provided that funds are available. No Meetings shall be held outside the Navajo Nation unless by written permission of the Speaker of the Navajo Nation Council, provided that funds are available; and further provided that the meeting is with a legislative body of another sovereign.

# SECTION FOUR. AMENDING RULE 22 OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL RULES OF ORDER

The Navajo Nation Council hereby amends the Navajo Nation Council Rules of Order as follows:

Rule 22. Vote

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D. For those delegates attending the Council Session in person, The recording of yeas and nays votes on all motions shall be done electronically. For those delegates attending the Council Session though a virtual method, the recording of yeas and nays votes on all motions shall be done by the delegate's verbal statement during the Session or via a dedicated text or email. All votes through virtual methods shall be announced on the record.

E. Voting by proxy or by any method by or on behalf of any delegate who is not physically present in the Council Chambers shall not be valid or permitted is prohibited and any such vote shall be invalid.

# SECTION FIVE. AMENDING RULE 21 OF THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL STANDING COMMITTEE RULES OF ORDER

The Navajo Nation Council hereby amends the Standing Committee Rules of Order as follows:

#### Rule 21. Vote

B. The recording of votes for, opposed, and abstentions on all motions shall be done by a showing of hands by all delegates attending in person except that. Votes of delegates attending virtually shall be recorded by the delegate's verbal pronouncement or via a dedicated text or email. All votes through virtual methods shall be announced on the record. aAbsteniton votes are not counted towards the votes for or opposed, but entered for the record only.

D. Voting by proxy or-by-any-method-by-or-on-behalf-of-any-delegate-who-is-not physically present in the meeting place shall not be valid or permitted is prohibited and any such vote shall be invalid.

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## SECTION SIX. CODIFICATION

The provisions of this resolution that amend or adopt new sections of the Navajo Nation Code shall be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Office of Legislative Counsel shall

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1	incorporate such amended provisions in the next codification of the Navajo Nation Code.
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3	SECTION SEVEN. SAVING CLAUSE
4	If any portion of this Act is determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court or by a
5	District Court of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme Court, the
6	remainder of this Act shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
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8	SECTION EIGHT. EFFECTIVE DATE
9	The provisions of this Act shall become effective according to 2 N.N.C. §221(B).
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11	SECTION NINE. DIRECTIVE
12	The Naabik'íyáti' Committee Title Two Reform Subcommittee shall review the
13	implementation of virtual attendance by delegates at Council sessions and Committee
14	meetings as a priority; and report any recommended amendments to the Navajo Nation Code
15	or Rules of Order to the Naabik'íyáti' Committee at least thirty (30) days before the start of
16	the regular Fall Session.
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
