**TITLE OF RESOLUTION:** AN ACTION RELATING TO THE NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEE, AND THE SUPPORTING FUNDING FOR VICTIMS OF CRIMES ACT IN THE UNITED STATES FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024

18	A. The Navajo Nation Council, as the governing body of the Navajo Nation, is entrusted	
19	with the responsibility to safeguard the interests, rights, and traditions of the Navajo	
20	People. 2 N.N.C. § 102(A).	
21	B. The Navajo Nation Council established the Naabik'iyati' Committee as a Navajo Nation	
22	Council standing committee with the delegated responsibility and authority to	
23	coordinate all requests for information, appearances and testimony related to proposed	
24	county, state and federal legislation impacting the Navajo Nation. 2 N.N.C. §§ 770	
25	(A), 701 (A)(6).	
26	C. The Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (VOCA) established the Crimes Victims Fund (the	
27	Fund) as a major funding source for victim services throughout the Untied States.

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1	D. The Crimes Victim Fund provides support for the following:
2	1. Victim Services, including funding to tribes for services and programs to
3	improve the investigation and prosecution of child abuse and neglect cases in
4	American Indian and Alaska Native communities;
5	2. Victim Compensation, covering medial costs, funeral and burial costs, mental
6	health counseling, and lost wages; and
7	3. Victim Assistance, including crisis intervention, emergency shelter, emergency
8	transportation, counseling, criminal justice advocacy.
9	E. The 2024 fiscal year budget proposes to cut VOCA funding by 40%, which would have
10	devastating results to the various programs VOCA supports.
11	F. The proposed VOCA funding reduction would impact thousands of victim services
12	providers nationwide, forcing them to close their doors and millions of victims would
13	lose access to these lifesaving services.
14	G. A reduction in VOCA funding would be especially impactful to Indian Country, as
15	Native women continue to face the highest rates of violence in the county and urgently
16	need these victim services and programs to continue to operation.
17	H. The Navajo Nation supports the letter by Honorable Amber Crotty, 25th Navajo Nation
18	Council Delegate, Chair of the MMIP Taskforce and member of the Navajo Nation
19	Budget and Finance Committee, urging Congress to maintain adequate funding for
20	VOCA in the fiscal year 2024. Exhibit B.
21	I. For the reasons stated above, it is in the best interest of the Navajo Nation to oppose
22	any reduction to the Victims of Crime Act for fiscal year 2024.
23	THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:
24	The Navajo Nation opposes any reduction to the Victims of Crime Act for fiscal year
25	2024 and urges Congress to maintain adequate funding for Victims of Crime Act to provide
26	the necessary and vital services to victims of crime throughout the United States, especially
27	in Indian Country.
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
