17	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY	
18	A. The Navajo Nation established the Law and Order Committee ("LOC") as a Navajo	
19	Nation standing committee with the authority to recommend or not recommend to the	
20	Navajo Nation President the permanent appointment of probationary Justices and Judges.	
21	2 N.N.C. §§ 164 (A)(9), 600 (A) and 601 (B)(10) (2012); see also 7 N.N.C. §355(E).	
22	B. "A probationary Chief Justiceshall not be recommended for permanent appointment	
23	unless he or she has received a satisfactory performance evaluation from the [Law	
24	and Order] Committee of the Navajo Nation Council at the conclusion of the	
25	probationary Justice'stwo year probationary term." 7 N.N.C. §355(C).

27	SECTION TWO. FINDINGS	
28	A. Chief Justice JoAnn Jayne completed a two-year probationary period and is now eligible	
29	for recommendation by the LOC for permanent appointment as Navajo Nation Chief	
× 30	Justice.	

- B. In accordance with 7 N.N.C §355 (E), the "...[Law and Order] Committee shall review the record and qualifications of each probationary Justice ... and shall recommend to the President whether or not each probationary Justice ... has satisfactorily completed the probationary term and should be appointed to a permanent position."
- C. Due to delays caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, Chief Justice JoAnn Jayne's public
 hearing and probationary status evaluations were delayed. In 2023, the Navajo Nation
 reopened after the COVID-19 crisis and the Navajo Nation government implemented
 measures to resume in-person functions. Included in the reopening measures was
 prioritizing evaluations for the judges and Chief Justice.
- D. As a part of the evaluation of the Chief Justice, LOC held a public hearing in thirteen (13)
 Navajo Nation communities to evaluate Chief Justice JoAnn Jayne for the permanent
 appointment. The purpose of holding the hearing in thirteen (13) communities
 throughout the Navajo Nation Judicial Districts was to give the public and judicial
 employees the opportunity to provide testimony. The hearing schedule is attached hereto
 as EXHIBIT A.
- E. The Chief Justice Evaluation Hearing held by the LOC was conducted in accordance to
 the "Hearing Rules of the Law and Order Committee of the Navajo Nation Council to
 Evaluate the Performance of Probationary Judges and Justices," (the "Hearing Rule(s)")
 adopted under Resolution JCMY-02-09 and amended by Resolution LOCJY-08-13.
- F. In accordance with Hearing Rule I(D) and Rule II, Navajo Nation Associate Justice
 Eleanor Shirley provided results of a performance evaluation and the results of two
 surveys conducted during Justice Jayne's probationary period to LOC, attached hereto as
 EXHIBIT B.
- G. In accordance with Hearing Rule IV, the Navajo Nation Bar Association Judicial
 Evaluation Committee ("JEC") provided oral testimony and a written evaluation report,
 attached hereto as EXHIBIT C. The JEC recommends Justice Jayne not be appointed
 permanently.
- 28 H. Public Testimony was allowed and provided under Hearing Rule XII, and included the29 following:
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1	a. Many of Chief Justice Jayne's family appeared in support of her for permanent		
2	appointment and testified to her upbringing and knowledge of Navajo language		
3	and culture;		
4	b. Current and former employees testified to their experience in working within		
5	the Judicial Branch, including the type of working environment that exists under		
6	Chief Justice Jayne's leadership;		
7	c. Members of the public having had contact with the courts testified to their		
8	experience with the court system under the leadership of Chief Justice Jayne.

10	SECTION THREE: EVALUATION AND RECOMMENDATION OF THE LAW AND		
11	ORDER COMMITTEE		
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13	Chief Justice Joann Jayne hereby receives a <u>satisfactory</u> performance evaluation		
14	and is recommended for permanent appointment as the Navajo Nation Chief		
15	Justice. In accordance with 2 N.N.C. § 601(B)(10)(b), the permanent Chief		
16	Justice shall be confirmed by the Navajo Nation Council.		
17			
18	Chief Justice Joann Jayne hereby receives an unsatisfactory performance		
19	evaluation and is not recommended for permanent appointment as the Navajo		
20	Nation Chief Justice. In accordance with 2 N.N.C. § 601(B)(10)(a) and 7		
21	N.N.C §355(E), the Navajo Nation President shall not appoint the probationary		
22	Justice to a permanent position.		
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
