TITLE OF RESOLUTION: AN ACTION RELATING TO HEALTH, EDUCATION AND HUMAN SERVICES, LAW AND ORDER, NAABIK'ÍYÁTI' COMMITTEES AND THE NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL; AMENDING THE NAVAJO NATION CODE, TITLE 10, CHAPTER 1, SUBCHAPTER 2, SECTION 106, TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF THE NAVAJO NATION BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBERS

PURPOSE: This legislation will amend 10 N.N.C. § 106 to reduce the amount of Navajo Nation Board of Education members from 11 to 5.

FINAL AUTHORITY: Navajo Nation Council

VOTE REQUIRED: Simple Majority

19	SECTION ONE. AUTHORITY	
20	A. The Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation	
21	Council, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 401(B)(6)(a), has the authority to review and make	
22	recommendations to the Navajo Nation Council on resolutions relating to education.	
23	B. The Law and Order Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, pursuant to 2 N.N.C.	
24	601(B)(14), reviews and makes recommendations to the Navajo Nation Council on	
25	proposed amendments to and enactments in the Navajo Nation Code.	
26	C. The Naabik'íyáti' Committee,, pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 164(A)(9), reviews proposed	
27	legislation that requires final action by the Navajo Nation Council.	
28	D. The Navajo Nation Council enacts laws and sets policy for the Navajo Nation,	
29	pursuant to 2 N.N.C. § 102.

SECTION TWO. FINDINGS

- A. The Navajo Nation adopted the Navajo Sovereignty in Education Act of 2005 (the "Act") on July 19, 2005, and established the Department of Diné Education and the 11 member Navajo Nation Board of Education.
- B. In 2018, pursuant to CAP-45-18, the Navajo Nation Council transferred a large portion of the Navajo Nation Board of Education's administrative responsibilities to the Department of Diné Education. The number of Navajo Nation Board of Education members, however, remained the same.
- C. With the transfer of the Navajo Nation Board of Education's administrative responsibilities to the Department of Diné Education, the Navajo Nation Council finds it relevant and appropriate for the Navajo Nation and for the education of its children to reduce the number of members on the Navajo Board of Education from eleven (11) to five (5) by amending 10 N.N.C. § 106.

SECTION THREE. AMENDING TITLE 10

A. The Navajo Nation Council hereby amends the Navajo Nation Code, 10 N.N.C.§ 106 as follows:

THE NAVAJO NATION CODE TITLE 10 EDUCATION

Chapter 1 Policy and Planning Subchapter 2. Diné Education

* * **

106. Navajo Nation Board of Education

A. Establishment-Navajo Nation Board of Education.

There is hereby established the Navajo Nation Board of Education (hereinafter, "the Board"), with the Executive Branch of the Navajo Nation government for the specialized purpose of overseeing the operation of all schools serving the Navajo Nation, either directly if under the immediate jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation, or if operated by another government, by joint powers agreements, memoranda of

1	understanding/agreement, cooperative agreements or other appropriate
2	intergovernmental instruments.
3	B. Membership.
4	1. The Board shall consist of 11 5 members.
5	2. The Ffive Board members shall be elected to four year terms, with one each at-
6	large from each of the following agencies: Western, Chinle, Fort Defiance,
7	Shiprock and Eastern. If vacancies occur in any of the five elected Board
8	positions, for any reason, the vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as
9	provided in the Navajo Election Code for school board members in 11 N.N.C. §
10	161(E).
11	3. Six Board members shall be appointed to six year terms by the President of the
12	Navajo Nation and confirmed by the Health, Education and Human Services
13	Committee of the Navajo Nation Council. These members will be appointed in
14	order to ensure that a variety of experience and knowledge is present on the
15	Board.
16	4. The six appointed members of the Board shall serve as the Board from the time
17	of the confirmation of all six appointed members by the Health, Education and
18	Human Services Committee until the five elected Board members are elected in
19	the 2006 Navajo Nation General Election.
20	5. If vacancies occur-in any of the six appointed Board positions, for any reason,
21	the President of the Navajo Nation shall make appointments to fill such vacancies
22	for the unexpired remainders of the vacant Board position term, subject to
23	confirmation by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee.
24	C. Qualifications of appointed/elected Board members.
25	1. The six appointed Board members shall meet the following qualifications:
26	a. Two appointed Board members will be individuals who are recognized for their
27	knowledge of traditional Navajo culture;
28	b. One appointed-Board-member will-be a school-administrator working on the
29	Navajo Nation;

1	c. Two appointed Board member will be parents of at least one child enrolled in a
2	Kindergarten, elementary, or secondary program on the Navajo Nation;
3	d. One appointed Board member will be a teacher employed in a Bureau of Indian
4	Affairs funded or state public school operating on the Navajo Nation.
5	21. The five elected All Board members shall have at least a four year academic
6	degree from an accredited college or university;
7	D. Qualifications of all-Board-members.
8	All Board-members shall-meet-the-following qualifications:
9	42. All Board members shall be enrolled members of the Navajo Nation;
10	23. All Board members shall be at least 25 years of age;
11	34. All Board members shall not be delegates to the Navajo Nation Council, a
12	member of a school board of a school operating on the Navajo Nation, or an
13	employee of the Department of Diné Education.
14	45. All Board members shall not have been convicted of a felony or of any crime
15	involving child abuse or neglect.
16	$\pm \underline{D}$. Meetings.
17	1. All meetings of the Board shall be public, and shall be held at a variety of
18	locations either on or in immediate proximity to the Navajo Nation so as to make
19	it possible for interested Navajo public and Navajo educators to attend.
20	2. The Board shall meet on such schedule as is necessary to carry out its
21	responsibilities, or at the call of its presiding officer.
22	3. An electronic record of the procedures of the Board shall be kept, and shall be
23	made available to the public in accord with the Navajo Nation Privacy and Access
24	to Information Act.
25	4. During meetings of the Board an opportunity shall be made available for the
26	public to speak on any issue before the Board.
27	<u>FE</u> . Compensation.
28	Board members shall receive payment for discharging their duties at rates set by
29	the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation
30	Council.

GF. Powers and duties.

- 1. The Board shall have general power to monitor the activities of all Bureau of Indian Education funded schools and local community school boards serving the Navajo Nation, including the authority:
- a. To assume control of local community controlled schools from the local community school board in situations wherein:
 - i. The Navajo Nation has received written notice of the intent of the Bureau of Indian Education to reassume any of the programs, or portions of programs, which the local community school is managing and operating under authorization from the Navajo Nation, pursuant to Public Law 93-638 or Public Law 100-297, as amended; or
 - ii. The Navajo Nation has sent written notice to the local community school board that the Navajo Nation has made a request for retrocession of the programs, or portions of programs, which the local community school is managing and operating under authorization from the Navajo Nation, pursuant to Public Law 93-638 or Public Law 100-297, as amended; or
 - iii. The Navajo Nation Board of Education has provided the local community school board with a written notice of its opportunity for a due process hearing held pursuant to regulations adopted by the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, at which the local community school board may appear and show cause why the programs, or portions of programs, which the local community school is managing and operating under authorization from the Navajo Nation pursuant to Public Law 93-638, as amended, or Public Law 100-297, as amended, should not be assumed by the Department of Diné Education;
- b. To report at least quarterly to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, and annually to the Navajo Nation Council.

- c. To report to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council any instance where the Board has assumed control of community controlled schools.
- d. To provide guidance for the school accreditation activities of the Navajo Nation North Central Accreditation Office.
- 2. Subject to Navajo Nation law, the Board is authorized to solicit funds, propose budgets and plans of operation, create positions, and establish organization relationships, and employ and supervise personnel through a chain of command. Provided, that the Board is not authorized to represent the Navajo Nation in consultation with federal, state, and local officials regarding any proposed changes in federal education legislation or educational programs, including new schools (including charter schools), school closures, consolidations, education budget initiatives and the like. These authorities are delegated specifically to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council, as set forth in 2 N.N.C. § 401 (B)(4).
- a. The chief administrative officer of the Board shall be the "Navajo Nation Superintendent of Schools," who shall be appointed by the Navajo Nation Board of Education, subject to confirmation by the Navajo Nation Council, and shall be empowered to do all things necessary and proper to carry out the responsibilities of the Board.
- b. Within budgetary constraints, and consistent with the Department Plan of Operation, the Board may establish such subordinate offices, staff, and advisory bodies, as necessary to carry out its duties and responsibilities.
- c. Propose needed Navajo Nation education legislation to the Health, Education and Human Services Committee of the Navajo Nation Council.
- d. Actively pursue funding to support the activities of Navajo Nation education programs.

1	SECTION FOUR. DIRECTIVE TO THE NAVAJO NATION BOARD OF EDUCATION
2	The Health, Education and Human Services Committee hereby directs the Navajo Nation
3	Board of Education to amend its Plan of Operation to conform with the provisions of this
4	Action.
5	
6	SECTION FOUR. CODIFICATION
7	The provisions of the Act which amend or adopt new sections of the Navajo Nation Code
8	shall be codified by the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Office of Legislative Counsel
9	shall incorporate such amended provisions in the next codification of the Navajo Nation
10	Code.
11	
12	SECTION FIVE. SAVING CLAUSE
13	Should any provision of this Act be determined invalid by the Navajo Nation Supreme Court
14	or the District Courts of the Navajo Nation, without appeal to the Navajo Nation Supreme
15	Court, the remainder of the Act shall remain the law of the Navajo Nation.
16	
17	SECTION SIX. EFFECTIVE DATE
18	The provisions of this Action shall become effective in accordance with 2 N.N.C. § 221(B).
